**Challenges:**

- Renewal Ranch is seeing more diversity, but they would like to increase diversity by more intentional outreach.
- Renewal Ranch has reached out to their marketing coordinator to discuss ways to increase intentional outreach.
- There were additional costs beyond creating the beds for the 40 additional residents that have been difficult to address. Renewal Ranch did not want to sacrifice quality for quantity. They are in a transitional period related to this expansion.
